

Free Movies in the Park!



Deputy's Corner

Greetings from your Creswell Lane County Sheriff Deputies. Creswell's Fourth of July celebration is a really big deal, not only to those visiting, but to the community, including Creswell's deputies. For decades, the city's population and vehicle traffic swells to astounding levels as activities like the parade, fireworks and assortment of other events occur around town. While enjoying the sunshine and the many things to do, we want to remind our citizens and visitors to stay safe while having fun.

Traffic is always a major issue both in town and in the surrounding areas as people are traveling to celebrate the holiday. The Fourth of July is historically a major day for both minor and major vehicle crashes throughout the county and the state.

Once in Creswell, residents and visitors alike need to take precautions to protect valuables. Property crime is often an opportunistic



crime. Lock car doors and don't store valuables in vehicles, especially in plain sight. Many thefts occur when a perpetrator finds a door unlocked or a window down, and the valuables become "easy pickings" for a thief. Make sure you lock your residence doors also when you leave to enjoy the festivities.



Fireworks are one of the greatest aspects of the Fourth of July celebrations. With this comes great responsibility for both personal safety and the community's safety. Personal fireworks are not allowed at any of the events for this reason. Fireworks can also create great stress on pets, and owners should make sure these companions are protected from direct contact, as well as the potential for a frightened pet to get loose. The State of Oregon has banned several personal fireworks to include aeriels and firecrackers due to the dangers of using these items outside of an approved event. The City of Creswell has adopted the Oregon Revised Statute language with re-

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Noxious Vegetation



Each year, between June 15th and September 30th, Creswell's noxious vegetation ordinance goes into effect. Noxious vegetation is defined as: weeds or grass more than 10 inches high, poison oak, poison ivy, blackberry bushes that extend into a public right of way or cross a property line, vegetation that is a health hazard, fire hazard or traffic hazard.

The ordinance also states that: An owner or person in charge of property shall cut down or destroy grass, shrubbery, brush, bushes, weeds or other noxious vegetation as often as needed to prevent them from becoming unsightly, from be-

coming a fire hazard, or, in the case of weeds or other noxious vegetation, from maturing or from going to seed. The City does abate these nuisances as required by ordinance, resulting in a cost to the property owner.

Please cut your grass, blackberries and/or other vegetation in an effort to reduce the potential fire hazard as July 4th approaches. It is also very important to trim those out of control bushes and shrubs, which prevent a driver from having adequate vision to see oncoming cars as-well-as pedestrian traffic. Thank you!



Water Conservation Tips



Smart watering not only lowers your water bill, but promotes healthy, disease and pest-free plants. Smart watering reduces the amount of fertilizer and pesticide runoff from landscapes into water sources where it can affect birds, fish and other food sources.

Simple tips for smart watering:

1. Add compost and mulch to your soil. Compost helps water to absorb more easily, and mulching prevents evaporation, and suppresses weeds.
2. Group plants with similar watering needs together so they all get the right amount of water.
3. Add drip irrigation for watering only where you need to. For more information on installing drip irrigation visit your local hardware store.
4. Remember watering deeply and less often not only reduces the amount of water you use, but encourages deep roots and healthier plants.

So how long should you water?

Most lawns need only about 1 inch of water per week in the summer and only half that much in September. To determine how much water your lawn is getting, place several clean tuna or cat food cans around your lawn and turn the sprinkler on for 15 minutes. Then measure the average amount of water collected and use this simple chart to estimate how long and how often you should water your lawn.



Average depth in cans after 15 minutes:

Soil Type:	1/8"	1/4"	1/2"	3/4"	1"
Clay Soil	2 hrs	1 hr	30 min	23 min	15 min
Loamy Soil	1 hr	30 min	15 min	11 min	8 min
Sandy Soil	40 min	20 min	10 min	8 min	5 min

For bedding plants check soil moisture with a trowel before watering. Water for 15 minutes,

then wait a few hours and check soil moisture again. Repeat this process until soil is moist as far down as the roots of your plants grow. For annuals, most roots are in the top 12" of the soil spreading just a short distance from the plant. For shrubs and perennials, roots can go down a couple of feet and extend two to five times the branch spread.

Advantages to Planting Native Plants

Local gardeners have long-known about or may be just discovering the advantages of planting native plants. These hardy and beautiful "guys" are not big water gulpers or too fussy about maintenance. They can be a whole new world to explore, linking you to Oregon's Forests and plains. And speaking of "links"...
